




Making a Christian Home.

The role of a wife and mother has been greatly threatened and damaged in the past 50 years. The pressure, propaganda, and humanistic philosophies under the guise of improvements for women, skewed ideas of equal rights for women, and our societies increasing secular view of life has denied, confused, and in many cases destroyed the biblically defined role for women. As a result, to discuss the biblical role is often emotionally charged, and difficult because of so many preconceived notions. We must keep in mind that Satan desires to destroy the institution of the home. The statistics given in the first handout show his success. One of his primary actions is focused on destroying the home through the wife and mother. This is precisely what he did in the Garden of Eden. As we move closer to the time of Christ's second return, and the continual decline of society, we as Christians must not abandon the clear timeless teaching of the Word of God. We must be committed to establishing our homes on the Rock (Mat 7:24), trusting that God knows precisely what is best for us, in contrast to the passing philosophies of a Christ rejecting society.

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- There are three major, and any number of minor issues regarding woman working outside the home. "Outside the home" being defined in our culture as being employed outside the home in the work force environment:
 - o One of those issues we have already touched on with Titus 2:5



- that is the home is the first priority for the wife and mother. When working outside the home, it places great pressure on this priority. Not only is the working wife not present during most daylight hours in the home, but when she is, most of her energy has already been expended with her job. It is extremely difficult for her then to prioritize the home or practically maintain excellence as a wife, mother, and steward of the home environment.

o A second issue of major importance has to do with the headship of the family. In Ephesians 5:22-23 we are told "the husband is the head of the wife." Also, in our Titus 2:5 passage "being subject to their own husbands." This is God's order for maintaining precise operational efficiency in the home along with appropriate peace and harmony.

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For the husband to maintain this role, it can be placed under great stress in an environment where husband & wife are both working outside the home. It can even sometimes generate unhealthy competition, and where the wife is additionally answering under the headship of a boss through the work place, diminish the role of the husband. Often the wife will find herself more diligent under the headship of her boss than her husband. At other times she may find herself at odds with the wishes of her husband because of her outside job. This kind of duel headship relationship over the wife interferes with the family function and often leads to serious problems.

 The necessary commitment and focus required in working outside the home also acts more often than not diametrically in opposition to the fostering of the relationships needed in the home environment. It also exposes the wife to other people who may tempt her to inappropriate behavior, or lead her astray from the headship of her husband.

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
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A third issue is the demanding attention of children in the home. Going back to <u>Proverbs 31:15</u> – she provides food. She is caring for the clothing of the children in <u>verse 31:21</u>. She is involved in instruction of her children in <u>verse 31:26</u>. In <u>verse 27</u> she is on top of everything going on with her household, and as a result "her children rise up and bless her" (<u>31:28</u>). A full-time mother working outside the home cannot give the energy and attention to her children as described in <u>Proverbs</u>

31. At best she must scramble to make up for lost time, and will be in a position of having to make many compromises because of her divided attention and personal exhaustion.

- In many if not most cases the children are placed with daycare workers who spend prime time with the children. This is obviously not equal to the influence, love, or commitment of the mother.
- Finally, the energy, emphasis, time, and dynamics of a wife working outside the home can place a great strain on the relationship between a husband and wife. As her focus is to be on her husband this is virtually impossible in most working outside settings.



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
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

care, daycare, and extra taxes). Also, the family must trust God – is God able to meet the families needs?

- Many circumstances play a role in all of the decisions about the correctness of a wife working: severe economic problems, health issues, the degree of home responsibilities, whether children are present and their ages, the strength of the marriage relationship, and the attitude of the husband who is head of the home.
 - For example, there can be: illness of the husband, disability that causes the husband to be unable to work, extreme family hardship, and of course separation in a marriage will likely cause the wife to work out of necessity. These are matters of necessity, not choice. All options should be carefully considered.
 - In new marriages, young couples often both work because the home may be a simple apartment that requires little attention, there are no children yet, and starter jobs are normally lower paying. Both working seems reasonable, but even in this there are stresses on the marriage as described above. These matters should be addressed by the couple and discussed





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The society that we live in (21st century America) has wandered far from the path of Biblical understanding, and this has taken its toll on how children are raised. Children are considered a burden by many, and therefore scores of married couples are purposely not having children. Such attitudes prevailing in this way also affect those families that do have children. There are also many children being reared in a one parent home, or in some cases a home with two mom's or two dad's. Those that are being reared in traditional homes, that is with a mother and father, are in most cases in a home where both parents are working, and children are thereby receiving less attention from their parents. Most children attend public schools, where the curriculum is based in secular humanism. Many false ideas are taught as fact, the focus is contrary to God, there are continuous assaults on truth, behavior is vain, and Christian philosophy is not present except generally to be ridiculed.

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
Temptations and worldly allurements are everywhere. To add further chaos to the environment is the sophistication of the modern internet with unlimited amounts of information, including the deepest conceivable degrees of wickedness. Cell phones and high end mobile devices make it easy for youth to be constantly interconnected with each other, and other media of distracting influence. Most youth receive much of their philosophy for living from the television and movies which are pumping out heathenism. Peer pressure acceptance, sports, and political correctness rule the world of our youth. Climate change (a false conception taught as fact) has taken the place of organized religion for most, and is taught as the greatest concern facing the world. Most churches that could have influence on youth have watered their messages, brought in the world's music to the church to entertain, and provide such a poor testimony they do more harm than good. The concept of people as products of evolution has brought about an animalistic mindset of non-accountability. Children are not understood to be sinners, in need of correction / discipline, and ultimately a work of God in the heart, but instead are creatures that require more education and selfesteem. In all these things and more we can see that the challenge


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for parents rearing their children in such an environment is indeed high, if not off-the-chart. However, what is righteously needed is a commitment to the Word of God, to do what it says, not mixing the world's child rearing philosophies with it, but wholly leaning on the wisdom of God, trusting His commands and Word. It is the Word of God that is alive and powerful, and dedication to following it in the enormously important matter of child rearing is the essential difference







The idea of "reward" is they should be seen as special from God Himself, and a blessing to those who have invested themselves in confidence in God for the building of their home (Ps 127:1-2). The children God gives should be considered a blessing with which he rewards or favors his people. This concept is again repeated in the history of the lives of God's own beginning with Adam and Eve, and even leading up to the birth of the greatest gift – the Lord


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
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The value of children (Ps 127:3-5; 139:13-16) ...continued. Jesus. This means to abuse or neglect God's gift (a child) is considered at the top of the chart of evil and hideous activity. The most grievous sins listed in the Word of God are sacrifices of children (Lev 20:2; Jer 19:5; Ez 16:20-21).

- "Like arrows in the hand of a warrior, so are the children of one's youth" (Ps 127:4). This depicts a time when men had to physically defend themselves from immediate enemies. Having a home full of strong sons, as Jacob (Gen 35:5), was a benefit and blessing.
 They were his special strength in the same way as a man with an arsenal (arrows). Although there is not the threat of immediate physical battles today, the blessing of the closeness of children, their support, strength, help, and encouragement is of the greatest magnitude of blessing in this life. That is why it is stated "blessed is the man whose quiver is full of them."
- It should be noted that in Scripture, one of the marks of severest judgment of God was always associated with offspring (Ps 21:10; Is 14:20; Ex 34:7). This means there should be no more significant matter in this life than the development and well-being of our children. As our most valuable asset nothing else compares.







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The nature of children...continued.



The heart is that intangible us, that addresses who we are. Gen 8:21 says that the "intention of man's heart is evil from his youth." That cute little baby we love is a little sinner. Every person fits under the realm of sin discussed in Roman's 3. Babies don't enter the world on neutral ground, all are totally depraved – sinners by nature in rebellion against God, and wanting to be our own god. Understanding the condition, and natural proclivity of the child to be disobedient, selfish, do wrong is the key to understanding how each child must be trained, and disciplined.

 As all are sinners by nature, a child cannot be allowed to grow up the way he would naturally go. The way he will naturally go is always toward evil (Gen 8:21). This is what is meant in the later part of Prov 29:15 "a child who gets his own way brings shame to his mother." A mother to any child is the most forgiving, and overlooking of all people, but even with her a child who is not driven away from sin brings shame.

O Sin is so severe, and so debilitating the baby cannot change his fundamental preference for sin and self to do what is right, nor have a desire to such a change. The curse of which all are under has so ruined them that even though they have a will, with a body, soul, & spirit, made in the image of God to rule, and have creativity; and they are moral beings with reasoning, and have been given a conscience, they are none-the-less by nature all the things the Bible describes concerning them (lovers of darkness, truth suppressors, enemies of God, unrighteous, full of deception and lies, etc...).

They are also in an environment of growing that is equally under the curse where their experience, motivation, and education are all tainted by a mixture of good and evil. They are also constantly tempted, and held captive by the temptation. They are to a degree held from complete ruin by the common grace of God (Gen 20:6; 2 Thess 2:7; Rom 1:18-28). In these conditions they begin making their journey which is made up of life's decisions. These decisions as a baby begin
